



Citizen Science Projects are becoming ever more popular. They are the perfect way to encourage curiosity and engagement with the natural world and help students develop and reconnect with their own sense of place. Citizen Science projects provide authentic inquiry-driven questions for students to answer through the scientific process. They allow students to take ownership of their data, share their results and engage in science. These types of activities lend themselves perfectly to in class teaching or independent learning. We will read "Exploring A Sense of Place" by Karen Harwell and JoAnna Reynolds and discuss the importance of place and Citizen Science Projects for promoting engagement in students. Holden educators will share their expertise and knowledge on how to successfully implement Citizen Science Projects utilizing neighborhoods and school yards and how this can complement and support your classroom learning objectives.

HYFLEX PERSONALIZED PROFESSIONAL LEARNING PROJECTS - ED 5502-5504 W-W1

The global pandemic forced changes in teaching and learning. Many educators had to reimagine lesson planning, delivery, assessment, and evaluation to meet the demands of a constantly shifting learning environment. Through the development of a personal professional learning project, with the support and coaching of the course facilitators, you will continue this learning process to dive deeper into unique areas of need that you have identified with time and space for reflection. If you have ever wanted to earn graduate credit for working on a project of your own design, this course is for you. You will have the option to sign up for 1, 2, or 3 semester hours, depending on the time commitment and depth of your project, with flexible starting and ending dates within the course window. After attending a mandatory VIRTUAL orientation meeting, you can work on your project as your schedule allows. During optional office hours, you can discuss ideas or receive personalized coaching to address specific questions that you have. Participants will share projects in a small group setting at the end of the course. LAKE ERIE COLLEGE COURSE MODALITY DEFINITIONS

HyFlex (HF) combines online and in-person instruction simultaneously into a single course section. Students are able to participate in various ways, such as real-time via video streaming, asynchronously by accessing materials and recorded lectures outside of the regular class time, or in-person (physically present in the classroom). There is a degree of choice (possibly) as to how students participate. *ED 55xx W*

Asynchronous Online (AO) are 100% online without any on-site face-to-face meetings required. Online course faculty may utilize a combination of group work, personalized assignments, online class meetings and various communication methods between students and faculty. The instructor and students all engage at different times and from different locations. Digitally facilitated meetings may be scheduled as per the instructors' discretion. ED 57xx W

Hybrid Courses (HB) offered in hybrid format (also known as blended) combines in-person instruction with web-based learning (e.g., video lectures, online discussions, or activities) that supplant one or more of the face-to-face sessions. This approach reduces the amount of time in the classroom by offering a portion of the course delivery online at the discretion of the instructor. **ED 60XX W**

In-Person Delivery (IP) or face-to-face. In-person courses follow a regular schedule (date, time) and are mostly synchronous in modality. Such courses might use electronic and digitally facilitated instructional resources in supplement to face to face instruction. ED 70xx W

ALL ED 57xx W courses are self-paced with a rolling registration. Your course is completed and graded independently. Courses begin as early as Monday, May 17 and all work is due no later than Monday, August 30. Registration will close on Friday, July 30 at 11:55 pm.

Your official transcript will automatically be sent to your home address when your individual grade is posted in LEO (you don't need to wait for the end of the semester). You may take these courses either Pass/Fail or a Letter Grade.

Once you register AND pay for your course(s) expect to hear from your faculty within 24-48 business hours of receiving the registration confirmation email (from prodel@lec.edu). If you don't hear from your faculty please check your Spam/Junk folder. Then contact the Director of PD at 440.375.7379.

These courses function in an autonomous manner because content has been created and recorded previously. You may be the only person enrolled; there is no minimum to run the course. You can email or schedule a phone call/Zoom/Google Meet with your faculty if you encounter difficulties. All ED 57xx W courses will "feel" somewhat like an independent, student led online experience.

All courses are K-12 except where noted with an *. All courses have alternative assignments/final paper/projects to fit all K-12 educators even if you do not have a classroom. You do not need to have previous experience with Schoology or Canvas or LEO to complete these courses.

ED 5781 W: What Phonics Can Teach Us About Older Struggling Readers

Faculty: Dr. Beth Walsh-Moorman & Dr. Kelly Moran Grade Levels: 4-12 | 3 GSH | Tuition: \$515

The science of reading recognizes the contributions cognitive psychology and neuroscience have made in our understanding of learning to read. Much of the focus has been on children learning to read, but in this course we will focus on how we can use what we know through the SOR to understand the role decoding and phonics may play in reading gaps among children fourth grade and older. In this course, teachers of students 4-12 will get an overview of what science tells us about decoding, explore how phonics plays an inextricable role in successful reading, and examine strategies and interventions that can be used to support the older student in developmentally appropriate ways. **This course runs in LEO.**

ED 6000 W: Embracing Racial Diversity to Create Inclusive Classrooms

Today's current events are forcing us to face our country's turbulent past and a history of racism. During this interactive online course, educators will learn about the historical foundations of race, become aware of their biases, and gain strategies to facilitate tough conversations. In addition, they will develop the tools to incorporate diverse perspectives and equitable practices to create inclusive learning environments for all students. The in-person session will meet Wednesday, July 7, from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. at Lake Erie College. An additional 6 hours of asynchronous learning must be completed by Wednesday, July 21. Your final project which includes the development of a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Plan is due no later than Wednesday, August 4.

ED 6001 W: Unpacking, Connecting, & Building with Ohio's Social & Emotional Learning Standards

Faculty: Melissa Solema | Grade Levels: K-12 | 1 GSH Tuition \$230 | Garfield Center, C13

Seeking to understand how Ohio's Social and Emotional Learning Standards fit into your classroom? Unpack the core competencies of each standard and make connections to your current teaching practices. Discover strategies that support a deeper, more connected learning experience, to strengthen the foundation of the five competencies: Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social Awareness, Relationship Skills and Responsible Decision-Making. This course focuses on building a crosswalk that incorporates an educator's mindset, philosophy, and district initiatives into a comprehensive approach for integrating Social Emotional Learning into instructional content and classroom environments. In this hybrid course, participants will use collaborative and reflective activities to support their learning with a combination of face-to-face sessions and asynchronous self-paced online learning modules. The in-person sessions will meet Monday, July 12, 4-7 p.m. and Monday, July 19, from 4-7 p.m. at Lake Erie College. An additional 6 hours of asynchronous learning, delivered through Google Classroom, will begin after the first in-person session on July 12th and must be completed prior to class on July 19th. Your final project is due no later than Monday, August 2.

ED 6002 W: Understanding Autism

Faculty: Dr. Katie Krammer | Grade Levels: PK-12 1 GSH | Tuition \$230 | Garfield Center, C13

This course delves into the characteristics of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and what that looks like from multiple perspectives including the clinical angle and the diagnostic criteria, individuals with ASD themselves, the teachers and specialists who work with students with Autism, as well as the family members. Participants who have limited experience with ASD will benefit as well as veteran practitioners through the opportunity to unpack the characteristics and needs, and gain insight through the variety of lenses. This class will be run in a hybrid fashion with one day of on campus time to include interactive discussion, videos, exposure to a wide variety of resources, and guest speakers. The in-person session will meet Tuesday, July 13 from 9 a.m.-4 p.m. at Lake Erie College. An additional 6 hours of asynchronous learning through two assigned modules and one of your choice, must be completed by Tuesday, July 27. Your final project which includes responses to the module assessment questions and reflection is due no later than Tuesday, August 10.

ED 7000 W: Google Certified Educator Level 1

In this week long course, we will learn and practice skills using Google Applications for Education to prepare for taking the Google Certified Educator Level 1 test. Study guides and example problems will be supplied, and the course will culminate on the final day with taking the test together as a group. Students will need to bring \$10 (payable via credit or debit card) to class to register for the exam. ED 7001 W: Beyond the Book: Building Reading Skills Using Engaging Print & Non-Print Sources (formerly Literacy Strategies Students Will Love & A Multi-Textual Approach to Close Reading)

Have you been looking for engaging literacy strategies to help your students get excited about understanding texts? Learning literacy strategies can be fun when students develop these key skills through a variety of sources including print, video, and visual texts. In this course, we will explore ways to develop student literacy in grades K-12 to engage students across all subject areas. We will use print sources, artwork, and video to develop strategies for teaching close reading and critical thinking. We will explore interesting content and web tools that will help you incorporate literacy strategies your students will love. You will leave this course with ideas for the texts you can use to stimulate thinking and analysis as well as strategies for engaging students in activities that will improve their literacy skills. ED 7002 W: Mental Health & Suicide Prevention in the Time of COVID-19



Faculty: Bridget Sherman | Location: Garfield Center, C13 | Grade Levels: K-12 | 1 SH | Tuition: \$230

This course will give participants the opportunity to explore how the pandemic may have impacted the mental health of educators and students alike, how mental health problems may be exhibited in the classroom, and what role educators can play in preventing suicide and mitigating mental health problems. Educators will learn how to recognize the risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, what evidence-based practices are available, and how to access local behavioral health resources. ED 7004 W: Local Women's Suffrage History



Faculty: Dr. Katharine Delavan | Grade Levels: 4-12 | Garfield Center, C13 | \$230

As early as the 1830's women's suffrage was a topic of interest among citizens in Northeast Ohio. This experiential course exposes participants to the history of the local women's suffrage movement and how it connected to the National suffrage movement. with an emphasis placed on the action of ladies from the Lake Erie Female Seminary (Lake Erie College) including; Frances Jennings Casement; Emma Gillette, Ellen Spencer Mussey, Elizabeth Bartlett Grannis, Mary Evans and Betsey Mix Cowles, to name a few. An examination of the strategies and rhetoric used by the suffrage movement; the evolving perspectives of three generations of suffragists, and the connection between the abolitionist and suffrage movements. Participants examine primary and secondary documents to use in their classrooms and develop student-centered learning experiences based on their chosen primary and secondary documents. This course includes a visit from Women in History who are scheduled to perform an historical interpretation of Frances Jennings Casement and Susan B. Anthony; a walking tour of the Painesville ERA's Parlor Talk locations, a visit to the Painesville Methodist Church (Site of 1885 Ohio Woman's Suffrage Convention), and a sneak peek at our new women's suffrage memorial.

ED 7005 W: The Best of Phonics in Motion

Faculty: Sally Maher | Grade Levels: PreK-3 & Remedial Readers | Garfield Center, C13 | \$230 plus \$99 for 1-year online access fee payable to PIM

This course will offer an overview of the four components of Phonics in Motion© (KMP's™, Reading and Writing Monster™, Language Calendar™, and Vowel House™). SUMMER 2021 - Lake Erie College offers fully online post-baccalaureate courses that lead to a Mild-Moderate K-12 Intervention Specialist License. These courses are designed for already licensed teachers, or those eligible for licensure, who are seeking to teach children in grades K-12 with mild-moderate disabilities and educational needs in a variety of inclusive settings. Coursework can be completed in one year (three semesters). This includes two six-week courses in the summer, two seven-week courses in the fall and two seven-week courses in the spring. Students can enter, stop and start at any point. Special Education Online License courses are \$600 per SH (\$1,800 per course).

EDS 300 PB/P2 - Introduction To Mild-to-Moderate Disabilities \mid 3 SH \mid 6 Weeks

This course explores the characteristics, prevalence, and definitions of mild to moderate disabilities including those individuals with learning disabilities, dyslexia, cognitive, behavioral and emotional, and speech and language disabilities as well as those who are on the Autism Spectrum. Historical and legal issues regarding the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act are addressed as well as current issues and trends in the field. *This course includes 5 Field hours.*

EDS 303 PB/P2 - Inclusive Strategies | 3 SH | 6 Weeks

This course will provide students with strategies to address students' needs through development of appropriate accommodations, modifications and interventions. Particular emphasis is placed on Cognitive Learning Strategies and other researched based methods for addressing the diverse needs of learners through Response to Intervention (RTI). All strategies are designed and implemented with the goal of promoting self-determination of individuals with disabilities.
